### Winding Down Your Practice What to do???

- DON'T REINVENT THE WHEEL
  - There are always people that have done what you are doing now.
  - Find them and talk to them!!!
  - Dodging landmines and pitfalls
- Clients
  - Remember that they come first and they chose you!

- Unforeseen Happenings
  - THEY WILL COME.
  - Leave some money in your office account to handle any business expenses that come after your close.
  - Keep your mailbox open.

#### Transitioning Out of Government Service Joining an Established Law Firm/Office

- Transition will be simpler than it will be to a sole practitioner's office.
- People will be there to help you with that transition.
- The Billable Hour System

- Your work ratios are different.
  - ADA 85% Attorney, 10% Politician, 5% Social Worker
  - Sole Practitioner 20% Attorney, 25% Politician,
     25% Social Worker, 20% Office Manager, 10%
     Marketer

- Chaos
  - Any given day, you will be:
    - In court
    - Evaluating new cases
    - Meeting with clients
    - Processing all your paperwork
    - Keeping up your accounting
- You have to change your mindset.

- You will not know how much income you will bring home at the end of the month.
- You will not know exactly how much your expenses will be at the end of the month.
- Budgeting and planning will not just be important. It will be absolutely necessary.

- It will be all you (at the beginning).
- You will be tasked with not only keeping your clients serviced, but also with keeping your business maintained.
- You will also have to choose exactly what kind of law you want to practice, and where you want to practice it.

- It's also very exciting!
- Always something new to handle or address.
- While you don't know how much you'll make, the potential for earning will always be higher in the public sector.
- Again, it's all you! (But in a good way)
